

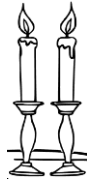

Summary – Part 4

Three days after Paro (Pharaoh) had let the Jewish people go, he changed his mind and set off with his army, traveling in horse drawn chariots, to reach them and bring them back. The Jewish people reached the Yam Suf (Sea of Reeds). They saw the Egyptians behind them and they had the water in front of them. They hadn't learnt how to swim in all their years of slavery and were now very frightened. They definitely didn't want to go back to Egypt.

According to the Medrash, a very brave man called Nachshon waded into the water. People called him back and but he carried on walking. The water was up to his knees and they said, "Nachshon, you can't swim!" and he replied, "I know that Hashem will help!" He continued further into the sea and when the water was up to his waist, the Jewish people said, "It's ok, Nachshon, just save yourself, turn around and come back!" Nachshon explained that Hashem (G-d) had saved them from Egypt and done all the plagues. "Surely He wouldn't abandon us now?" At that moment, Moshe (Moses) stretched his hand over the sea and Hashem split it into two, with a dry path in the middle.

The Jewish people walked through the path in the middle of the sea, from one side to the other. The Egyptian army followed and once the Jewish people were safely out of harms way, Hashem closed the water and all the army drowned, with the exception of Paro.

Moshe's sister, Miriam, led the ladies in joyous song and dance. The Jewish people traveled through the desert for forty years, until they reached the land of Israel. Hashem led them on their journey with a cloud by day and a (non-dangerous) fire by night. When the cloud moved, they followed it and when it settled, they camped, and the same thing happened with the fire at night.

1) She Sells Seashells on the Seashore

Link: Hashem split the sea

Children sit in a circle and the first person very slowly says, "She sells seashells on the sea shore." The next person has to say it a little faster. Each time the pace picks up slowly. If someone gets it wrong, they have to step out of the circle as they are out. The game starts again with the next person in the circle but slowly, back to the original pace. The game continues until there is one player, who can say the whole thing, very fast, three times in a row.
